Jim Marrujo The Grave Digger

When I worked at Mary's Mini Mart, at the junction on Liberty Road and Hwy 88, I would see the same smiling faces every morning. Each person had their own time frame to stop by for coffee and a donut to catch up on the news. Jim came in most mornings around 8:15 wearing his ground keeper's uniform heading for the 49er Cemetery up the road near Jackson. As time went on I noticed that sometimes he was out of uniform. I thought that he might be taking a day off to go fishing but when I asked him one morning he replied no he was heading up to Placerville to dig a grave. I was stunned as I had never met anyone who dug graves. Jim went on to explain that he was on call 24 hours a day seven days a week and that he was one of a few men that still dug the graves by hand with just a pick axe and shovel. He told me that there were not many of them left in our state. This intrigued me to the point of asking if there was any law which prohibits someone from watching him and to my delight the answer was no. Jim digs graves at different locations, Lock Rd in Lockeford, Clements Glen View, Fiddletown, Linden, downtown Jackson, Placerville and on private property when allowed. Why these cemeteries I asked and was told that all of these cemeteries were old and in certain areas even a small backhoe is not permitted, due to damages to graves, headstones and bushes. Since I grew up in Clements it was only fitting that I chose Glen View to be an eye witness to the in my opinion oddest job someone could have.

I remember May 14th, 1997 very well as Jim called to inform me he would be digging in Clements, so I asked for the day off and armed with bottled water, pen and paper I took off for the cemetery. I had been concerned about the weather but it turned out to be a beautiful day. My other concern was that I would know the person the grave was been dug for the chances were high as I have lived in Clements most of my life and it turns out that I had know Mr. Wehunt.

As I walked down the long driveway to Jim's truck I could hear the sounds of squirrels, birds and the moving breeze rustling in the trees. It had been years since I had walked through Glen View and the names on the headstones brought back quick fond memories of the families I recognized. As I approached the site, Jim was busy, first digging then wheeling the barrows of soil away to a pile, he informed me it was to be a double grave. That is not side-by-side, but stacked and which would be the first for Glen View. Therefore the depth was deeper than a normal single. I watched in amazement as his shovel heaved the dirt out. He eventually carved a perfect oblong hole in the once flat ground. Once the proper shape was formed, the next task was to dig deep enough to hold two caskets, which certainly was no easy job, as I watched I noticed after only two or three shovels full of dirt Jim had stop to chop out tree roots. I sat on a concrete curb, sipping cool water while the sun got hotter with every shovel and wheelbarrow full of dirt, still, Jim was kind enough to answer my questions while he dug. I learned that Jim has been doing this for 13 years which has turned into 20 years now, and he digs an average of 500 to 600 graves in a year's span. Sometimes the total even reaches 800. He is contracted by the mortuaries to dig each grave, he likes to have at least 48 hours notice, although he has dug at least one grave at 3 AM for a funeral at 10AM that same morning. Prices vary between a single grave or stacked graves. The location of the cemetery, and the type of ground, with the Mother Lode area costing more. It takes two and a half (2 ½) to three (3) hours to finish a site. Jim finished work the first day at 11:30AM as he had placed the concrete liner into the hole. It will be necessary for Jim to return the day of the service to set up the chairs and other items for the grave side service. When the last goodbyes are said, Jim gets started removing the earlier set-up, then he places a concrete cap on and starts back filling the site with the dirt that had been removed the day before. The grave looks different, yet somehow, almost the same as before Jim dug the site. I wonder how he can do this type of work but as he finishes up I notice the same peaceful tone to everything. Even in death life moves on, squirrels chase each other, birds sing, the rabbits dart in and out.

So if you were thinking of purchasing a plot, you could save some money if you do it before the new year. Cremation sites will increase from \$250 to \$300. Single plots will increase from \$650 to \$800.
